The Most Wonderful Time

The following story was submitted by a resident at Riley Hospital.

It's the Most Wonderful Time of the Year...

It's that time of year again. Holiday time. While I may aspire to live in a state of constant gratitude for the wonderful people and things in my life, I honestly find myself most aware of my blessings during the holidays. Especially when I reflect on the events of the past two years...

In 2006, around this time of year, I was putting in long hours in the PICU, awaiting the ever uncertain homecoming date for my husband. His National Guard unit had been deployed to Kosovo for 13 months, and was due home any day. Thanks to training and deployment time, we had lived the first 18 months of our 19-month marriage apart. We spent three birthdays, our first anniversary, two Thanksgivings, Christmas, and the first half of my residency apart. He came home on Dec. 8, 2006, just in time for Christmas.

It was truly the happiest Christmas of my life, and as I spent that wonderful time with my husband, after such a long time apart, I found myself drowning in a sea of gratitude – for him, for his safe return, for the strength of our marriage, and for my fellow resident friends at Riley, who made that 18 months of feeling like my world had been turned on its ear more bearable.

I was grateful: For the chiefs, who during the summer of my intern year, made me post call on the occasional Fridays my husband could fly home for a weekend visit during his pre-deployment training. Those were truly “golden weekends” ... for the colleague who rounded one morning so that I could have four more precious hours with my husband before he flew back to base ... for those who took an ER shift or who kindly swapped another so I could fly back to Texas for the deployment ceremony ... for the friends who shared birthday cake with me one year and dinner another year, so I wouldn't be alone on my birthday ... for the friend who shared countless hours of her friendship over cups of coffee, plates of dinner, pedicures, shopping trips, and phone calls ... for another who grabbed a box of tissues for me one morning in the 2A workroom when waking up without my husband yet another day had just gotten the better of me for a moment. ... For those teammates who covered my afternoon and evening call hours the weekend my husband was finally released from Fort Hood to come home ... and for the countless other Riley friends who asked me how I was doing, offered a word of encouragement, or said a little prayer for my husband's safe return during his absence. For them and all of their kindness, I was so very grateful.

It's been over a year since my husband returned home, and as we come upon another holiday season, I find myself so full of gratitude for the time we've had together, for our baby girl, for his new job here in Indianapolis, for our church home and, of course, for all of my dear friends and colleagues at Riley who continue to share their friendship and kindness with each other and with my family and me. Our heartfelt thanks to you all.

Wishard burn center recognized

The American Burn Association and the American College of Surgeons have re-verified the Richard M. Fairbanks Burn Center at Wishard Health Services as an adult level one burn unit, the highest level of burn care available. This achievement recognizes the burn center's dedication to providing optimal care for burn patients.

The Richard M. Fairbanks Burn Center at Wishard is one of only 50 burn centers in the United States verified as a level one burn unit. The center treats more than 350 inpatients and 1,500 outpatients each year. Since 1993, the burn center has seen an increase of approximately 15 percent per year in the number of patients treated.

The verification process includes a rigorous review program designed to verify a burn center's resources that are required for the provision of optimal care to burn patients from the time of injury through rehabilitation.

IUSCC seeks proposals for ACS grants

The IU Simon Cancer Center is pleased to announce the availability of funds for new pilot projects to assist new investigators who hold the rank of assistant professor, research assistant professor, or assistant scientist. These funds are from the American Cancer Society Institutional Research Grant.

This grant provides support for beginning investigators to enable them to initiate their independent research program. Funds are available for 4-5 pilot projects in amounts up to \$25,000. Special funds also are available for one pilot study in the amount of \$30,000 within the special topic of cancer disparities focused on underserved populations.

The purpose of the ACSIRG program is to attract new investigators from Indiana University into cancer research and to provide support for new pilot studies that will provide preliminary data for the investigator to develop into studies that will compete successfully for external, national funds from both federal and private sources. Faculty from the IUSM and its regional campuses, the IU schools of nursing, dentistry, optometry, public and environmental affairs, health and rehabilitation sciences, liberal arts, law, science, and informatics are encouraged to apply.

Eligibility: Applications are invited from faculty with ranks of assistant professor, research assistant professor, or assistant scientist. Proposals must describe new pilot studies in cancer research. ACS guidelines specify that applicants with prior funding from the ACSIRG or with significant funding from other sources are not eligible to apply. Applicants must be U.S. citizens, or submit proof of approval for a green card. Applications from research assistant professors and assistant scientists require a letter from the department chair certifying that the research proposal is independent of the research program of the laboratory P.I.

The funding period will be Feb. 1, 2009, through Jan. 31, 2010.

The body of the proposal must not exceed 6 pages. Appendices may not be more than 4 pages. Proposals must follow formatting guidelines of fonts of Helvetica or Arial, font

size 11 point or larger, and ½ inch margins. An electronic copy in .pdf format should be submitted to Elizabeth Parsons, grants coordinator, at eparsons@iupui.edu.

Proposals which exceed the page numbers or fail to follow the formatting guidelines will be returned to the investigator without review.

American English intonation class begins in January

The Department of Pediatrics at Riley Hospital for Children is accepting enrollments for the next class of American English Intonation: Effective Intercultural Communication, a course for international medical students, residents, fellows, postdocs and faculty at IUSM.

The class, beginning in January, reflects the success of initial classes launched last fall. The August and September courses were filled to capacity. This service is made possible by support from a Clarian Values Grant.

The next class begins Tuesday, Jan. 6, and continues for 12 weeks with sessions from 3 to 4:30 p.m.

The purpose of this program is to enhance the participants' professional communication with colleagues, patients and staff. Students learn to minimize their non-native accents, thus bringing the focus back to their exceptional academic abilities and increasing their opportunities for professional advancement.

Course focus is on neutralization of international accents through training in American English sounds, intonation and rhythm patterns. In order to maintain the participant's individuality and cultural diversity, the goal is on reduction (not elimination) of accents.

Trained language professionals teach the course with the help of textbooks, audio and videotapes. The training includes a detailed analysis of each participant's recorded speech as well as personalized assistance for his or her specific communicative needs.

The program is a collaborative effort with Indiana Center for Intercultural Communication and the Clinical Skills Education Center.

EndNote X2, a workshop on the latest changes

For training in EndNote X2, the latest edition of the citation management software, the next Getting Started with EndNote workshop is in the Medical Sciences computer lab MS B016 on Wednesday, Dec. 17, from 2:30 to 4 p.m.

1. Use EndNote X2, which has significant new features and a new look

2. Import citations from Ovid Medline, which also has a new look, and PubMed
3. Insert citations into a MS Word 2007 document—it now has a tab instead of a toolbar
4. Change style of references in a MS Word document

EndNote tracks important literature references including URLs and PDFs of full text of articles. Bye, bye to photocopies in your bulging file cabinet. As you are writing a grant or manuscript in MS Word, EndNote will insert the citation and automatically place the reference at the bottom of the document.

Cultural competency in health care online test

With the increasing diversity of the United States' population, physicians are more and more likely to encounter situations that require the delivery of culturally competent care, access to a vast array of language services, and supportive health care organizations. Consider that within 50 years, nearly half of the nation's population will be from cultures other than white, non-Hispanic, increasing needs to provide medical services to patients of diverse cultures or languages. Additionally, cultural and language differences may engender misunderstanding, lack of compliance, or other factors that negatively influence clinical situations.

The US Department of Health and Human Services offers a free opportunity to increase cultural competence with an effective on-line module at cccm.thinkculturalhealth.org/. Participants can earn 9 free CME credits (physicians and physician assistants), 9 contact hours (nurse practitioners), or 9 contact hours (0.9 CEUs) (pharmacists) while exploring engaging cases and learning about cultural competency in health care. Deadline for submission of the evaluation and test is Wednesday, Dec. 31.
